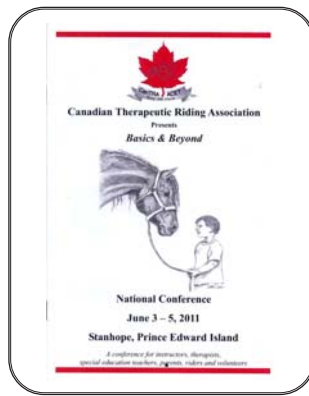

Spring 2010 highlights included a new mounting ramp donated by Elwood and Nancy Lawton, and a mechanical lift fund-raised by the board. Both of these are valuable back-savers.

The summer Introductory program accommodated four riders from the waiting list, three of whom were assessed to move into the main program. Of these, Mikaela Arsenault was able to start in the fall session and fitted in well. Riders continued to take turns on sabbatical, while Tracey Crane retired from the program after 10 years.

Two riders, Claire Lockhart and Hannah MacLellan, participated in the Para-Equestrian Canada "Sea To Sea" national dressage video competition (thanks to Mel Gallant for running the video recorder). In the Novice 1a class, Claire placed third with 62.105 points and Hannah placed second with 64.737 points. Congratulations to both girls! We plan to do more of these in our fall 2011 session.

We are extremely fortunate to have such wonderful volunteers. Their duties include preparing the horses, arena and equipment, leading and side-walking, even poop-scooping and sweeping the barn floor. 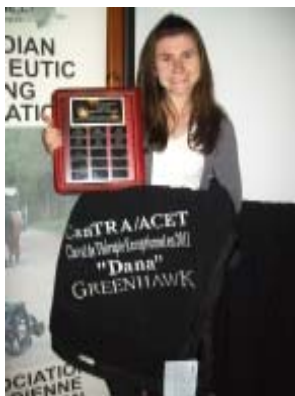

PEI's own Kara Grant, a two-time pentathlon Olympian and former Charlottetown Pony Clubber, delivered the keynote speech. She spoke movingly of her teenage experience with her first and decidedly most challenging pony, who unknowingly sowed the seeds of strength through adversity that her future chosen sport would later demand of her.
