


Plans are in the works to remember Andy in a meaningful and ongoing way. The board will announce details in the New Year.

DONATING JUST GOT EASIER!



BETTER LATE THAN NEVER


COVID disrupted many AGMs this year, including ours. We finally held our 2020 AGM in October (instead of May).
